Energy efficiency improvements to community building

Resource Efficient Scotland

Resource Efficient Scotland supports non-domestic buildings with energy audits either over the phone, or if the resource expenditure is high enough to warrant it, with a site visit. The basic information they ask for as a starting point is about the structure of the building, its insulation or lack of, the heating system and controls, lighting and controls, and expenditure on energy water waste and 'resources'.

Resource Efficient Scotland also offers a <u>loan</u> which is provided by Scottish Government via Energy Saving Trust. Loans are interest free (0%), unless applying for a renewable technology and the applicant is intending to receive the Feed in Tariff or Renewable Heat Incentive when the interest rate is 5%. Applications must be supported by a qualifying report, normally developed by the **Resource Efficient Scotland Advice & Support Service - Tel. 0808 808 2268.**

Church of Scotland properties

Under the Better Heating Scheme, which is administered by the Church of Scotland General Trustees, congregations can obtain, for a modest fee, skilled advice in the matters of saving money on heating bills and improving the standard of comfort of buildings. see http://www.churchofscotland.org.uk/ data/assets/pdf file/0010/2998/heating guide.pdf

Climate Challenge Fund

Several community buildings have benefited from a grant from <u>Climate Challenge Fund</u> which has covered the cost of insulation, secondary glazing, and lighting upgrade, but not heating or renewables. Engagement with the community to reduce energy use in the building, and at home, is expected to accompany the refurbishment work within the project.
